If this turns out to be our final Network newsletter, I would like to thank Stephne for all of her hard work in cajoling us into writing something each time and for putting it all together. The Newsletter has been very interesting to read as well as a lovely way to keep in touch with our neighbours and to find out how everyone has been operating.

Sheila Underwood of Thrapston u3a sent a brief outline of what her understanding of "Click and Save" is all about:

This is a rebate scheme for members offering savings from retailers. It costs us nothing but could provide an income. It is a benefit for u3a members and is organised by the Trust through Parliament Hill (marketing website) and records etc are kept by Blackhawk Network.

In summary (as she understands it) it works as follows :

1 We as trustees of our charity express an interest in the scheme.

2 One trustee is named as the link person.

3 That person will receive an identification number and a batch of access numbers.

4 We then advertise the scheme to our members.

5 Any member who wants to join the scheme contacts the link person who issues them with the ID number and allocates them an access number.

6 The link person notes and keeps a record of the name, membership number and access number allocated.

7 The member uses the two numbers to access the portal and then sets up their own account and password.

8 The member then chooses the card they wish to use; it may be an ecard or a physical card. It is entirely up to them. It may be for a single store or be a One 4 all card.

9 They load the card with some money using a debit card and they can then use it like cash; for example they shop at Morrisons, Costa or Sainsburys, do their shopping, swipe their loyalty card to get their points and then swipe their card to pay the bill.

10 They pay the full price but their purchase is recorded and they gain points for every pound spent (the number of points depends on the discount offered by that retailer).

11 When they have got 2500 points or £25 in their account, they can use that as a cash voucher to pay for further purchases.

12 Our U3A will receive 10 % of their saving.(but we cannot claim Gift Aid on their subscription)

There seems to be a good range of firms involved. The obvious one missing is Tesco. Open the App, click on the Profile button near the top right-hand corner: Make sure you don't click on the settings icon by mistake. Click on "Check for Updates" – fourth from bottom. Zoom will either start an update or tell you your version is up-to-date. It's important because some functions only work in the latest version! So, if you've been looking for functions others can find and you can't, you probably need to update!
